THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT - GOSPEL OF LUKE

Some people told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with the blood of their sacrifices. Jesus said to them in reply, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were greater sinners than all other Galileans? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did! Or those eighteen people who were killed when the tower at Siloam fell on them— do you think they were more guilty than everyone else who lived in Jerusalem? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did!"

And he told them this parable: "There once was a person who had a fig tree planted in his orchard, and when he came in search of fruit on it but found none, he said to the gardener, 'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none. So cut it down. Why should it exhaust the soil?'

He said to him in reply, 'Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future. If not you can cut it down.'"

SCRIPTURE MESSAGE REFLECTION

This Gospel story of the fig tree is about the patience of God, - Jesus reminds us the Father always believes in our future. God gives us a chance to change. Not just one opportunity, but many. Repent, but also grow....do not stand still...turn on this journey of "metanoia".

Luke also wants us to see that, for God, repentance is a fruit of our faith....but for it to work, it needs attention, needs cultivating, etc. **Don't** give up on yourself – God hasn't.....


Yet don't miss out on another key part of Jesus' teaching – to wake us up to the judgment to come. There is an urgency. As well, God gives us second chances, but that is not a pass to keep on sinning. Take this matter seriously in this earthly season so we may live forever in the eternal garden.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

FIRST READING: Moses and the burning bush.... In which unlikely places have you encountered God? Consider what makes a space "sacred ground". Only places like the mountain of the Transfiguration? The burning bush of Moses? What about the fig tree garden?

SECOND READING: Paul says, remember the history of our ancestors ...and learn from it. If you and I are baptized into Christ – what does that mean? Do you understand the "fine print" of this covenant – that between baptism and eternity sacrifice is necessary? How have you sacrificed for Christ? Are the sacrifices you may have chosen for Lent ones that may bear fruit beyond the season?

GOSPEL: What aspect of your life – career, relationships, friendships, church – are bearing fruit right now? How can you fertilize the parts that are not? What is urgent in this "season" of life? Are you using the gift of time on earth well?
